Modeler's "Silver Bullets" ...

As modelers, seems like we are always on the lookout for the perfect paint, tool, or technique that will magically help us get the build done just right the first time every time. (I know. If it were that easy, what fun would this hobby be.) Anyway, just like buying another kit we don't need, we keep looking for magic solutions. Let us know about the paint, tools, supplies, and techniques that work for you.

From Jim Elmore: Vallejo Metal Color

If you have been in this hobby for a while, you have probably battled the issue of producing a convincing bare metal finish. We have used Testors PLA silver (which never dries), Floquil Old Silver, decanted aerosol paints, bare metal foils, SNJ powder and many other products. I had good results with Polly Scale metallics.

Things improved greatly with Testors Metalizer. This gives a very convincing finish in a wide range of shades but is fragile and easily damaged. Alclad came with similar quality and much better durability. The lacquer base can be an issue, though. Some people seem to have problems with Alclad, but he will eventually succeed.

We now have a new option that may have escaped your notice. Vallejo Metal Color is a line of water-based acrylics pre-thinned for airbrushing. These are astonishingly finely grained, and very simple to spray. They also are terrific for hand brushing, and this may be the tipping point for many modelers. If you have a small part that needs a metal finish, you could pull out the airbrush and Alclad, OR hand paint it with Metal Color. So easy and simple.


Metal Color comes in about a dozen shades of "silver" plus copper and gold. For our purposes, they sell a four pack of colors available through Amazon or Hobby Lobby.

This is a very good product that greatly improves the modelling experience.



JIM'S PRINTED MATTERS



Twin Mustang is #55 in the *Legends of Warfare: Aviation* series from **Schiffer**, and is unique in that it highlights one aircraft, which happens to have been restored here in Georgia. First comes a developmental history of the P-82, providing a full history of second XP-82 prototype 44-83887 from its construction until it was written off after sliding off an icy runway in 1949, after which it was acquired by the enigmatic Walter Soplata, who kept the remains on his Ohio farm. Meanwhile, this section of the book includes diagrams from the pilot's manual which show annotated views of the instrument panels and side panels, and includes the record-breaking 1947 flight of P-82B *Betty Jo*, which now resides in the USAF Museum. A description of the production variants follows; interestingly the A- thru D-


were all experimental whereas the E- thru H- were the production versions. Operational service in the Korean War is glossed over in but two pages (!), and then comes the book's highlight: the story of the recovery and restoration of 44-83887 by Tom Reilly in Douglas, GA. The rebuild story is accompanied by numerous color photos and occupies 41 pages of the 112-page book; another 24 pages show detail photos of the finished aircraft, including it in flight. This is thus a wonderful book for modelers of the F-82, and is worth looking into even if the aircraft doesn't particularly interest you, just for the remarkable story of the rebirth of 43-83887.

The *TankCraft* series from **Pen & Sword** has grown quite rapidly, due in no small part to a 12-volume series fully detailing the usage of the Panther and Tiger tanks in different theaters and years. During the same period, though, a more widely-used Panzer was confined to a single book that attempted to tell the tank's entire story in one book! Fortunately, P&S have seen the error of their ways and the result is #35, **Panzer IV Medium Tank**, *German Army and Waffen-SS, Normandy Campaign, Summer 1944*. Dennis Oliver, who penned the 12 books mentioned above, is again the author, and the content is similar. The b&w portion starts with a detailed timeline of the Panzerwaffe's activities in Normandy, followed by a detailed breakdown of the units, in text and diagrams, with plenty of photos. The technical section shows salient features of the tank and describes all the mods made during the covered period. The color portion starts with 10 pages of color side views, with close-ups of



markings and added views to show what was hidden behind the side skirts. There are 4 galleries of well-built models in 3 scales, and 5 pages briefly reviewing all recent Panzer IV kits that fit the period covered. I have to believe that this is the first of a series of Panzer IV books from this source, and it is highly recommended.






In the same series, #37 is **M60 Main Battle Tank**, *America's Cold War Warrior*, 1959-1997. Here the b&w content is rather different, giving a complete description of the tank's development and all the variants and modifications, followed by the service history, concentrating on the M60's use with U.S. forces, though there is a section describing its use with foreign forces. The color portion starts with 9 pages of color side views mixed with photos, then 7 galleries of built models in 2 scales, one being a combat engineer vehicle. Then come 7 pages reviewing kits and accessories. This makes a useful follow-on to their earlier book on the M48.

As a former Grumman engineer, I feel that the Albatross has not gotten its printed due, with an early Ginter book being the only one I know of, until **HU-16A Albatross** in the *Italian Aviation Series* from **Aviation Collectables**

Company. As you might expect, this concentrates on Italian usage of the amphibian, but roughly ¼ of the 64-page monograph does cover the aircraft's development and U.S. service, with some nice photos, many in color. The book is obviously catering to modelers, as there is a page of color side views, a kitbuild article of the Trumpeter 1/48 kit (which did come in an all-Italian release) and 2 pages of color detail photos of both the exterior and interior. And the text is bilingual, so you won't have a problem there, aside from the fact that the English text is in italics, which makes it a bit hard to read. Other books in this series on American types include the SB2C-5, F-84F, F-86K, T-33, Sea King, Huey and C-130J.





The Dornier Do 335 has been an aircraft that has always fascinated me, and it inspired me to do something I don't often do, which is to buy a book which consists almost entirely of drawings. Such is the case with #124 in **Kagero**'s *TopDrawings* series, **Dornier Do 335 Pfeil A**. After a one-page (bilingual) description of the aircraft come 15 pages of 1/72 line drawings of various versions of the Do 335A; these range from one view to six views. Many of these are repeated in 1/48 and 1/32 on three double-sided removable foldouts. There is a single color four-view of aircraft 113 and two color side views on the back cover of two more aircraft. Two pages of color photos complete the package. And another volume on the Do 335B is due out shortly.

Four from **Osprey** this month! *Air Campaign* #29 is **The Kamikaze Campaign 1944-45**, which tells the story of how Japan came up with the concept of Special Attack units and how they operated, and what the Allied fleets did to counter them. Maps show the locations of Kamikaze attacks and an example of how they were used, and there are the usual combat paintings. I had hoped for more information about aircraft designed specifically for the mission: the Ki-115 and the Ohka bomb, but there isn't much detail provided. There isn't much here for the modeler, but the book makes for interesting reading.





Combat Aircraft #145 is Macchi C.202/C.205V Units in Combat, which is quite useful, because not much has been written about Italian fighters in combat. Not only are the three Italian air forces that used the aircraft during the war covered, so is usage by the Germans, the Croatians and the Egyptians. First-hand reports by pilots, even aces, that you probably have never heard of, are here, as are the usual 10 pages of color side views, and 3 pages of unit patches. These were good aircraft in the right hands and their story deserved to be told.

New Vanguard #306 is German and Italian Aircraft Carriers of World War II, which is clearly a "what if" book, because none of the ships covered was ever completed, and some never left the drawing board.

You've probably heard of the *Graf Zeppelin* class, and they are covered, but the only illustration that might be useful to modelers is a two-page annotated isometric cutaway. The aircraft intended for the class are described in some detail as well. The narrative for both countries actually starts with WW I developments and concepts from the interwar period, and most of the other ships described were modifications of merchant ships. The color side views show some of these as they might have appeared in service. Unless you have an aversion towards books about unbuilt designs, this is a rather fascinating volume.

Finally comes *Raid* #57 which is **Operation Jericho**, which describes the most famous of all the low-level Mosquito missions, the raid on the Amiens prison in February 1944. As expected, the book covers the reason for the raid, the planning, the execution and analysis of the results. There are fine maps showing the route used and details of the actual attack runs, and some effective combat paintings; it may surprise you to know that Typhoons participated as well. While some insist the raid was unnecessary, it did happen, and this book probably provides the best graphical depiction yet published.
